Best Practices in Integration Inservice Training Model – A fabulous assemblage of materials on collaborative consultation to build the capacity for inclusion. Cost: \$25.

Blended Practices for Teaching Young Children in Inclusive Settings – Bridging the gap between special and general education, this resource integrates knowledge about effective practices for teaching young children with and without disabilities into one comprehensive approach. This core text is easy for students to use - it's filled with visual aids such as tables, figures, and sample forms; vignettes and practical examples that illustrate key concepts and guiding principles; helpful summaries for each chapter; and dozens of learning activities that challenge students to test and expand their knowledge and improve outcomes for all children. Coaching Families and Colleagues in Early Childhood – Coaching is offered, through this book, as an effective strategy for supporting other professionals and families in the work of early intervention. Readers will 1) learn about essential qualities such as objectivity and adaptability, 2) cultivate communication skills such as observing, listening, and planning, 3) consider key issues such as ensuring administrative support, and 4) reinforce what they learn with engaging anecdotes, reflection questions, points to remember, and practical forms. Cost: \$29.95

The Inclusive Early Childhood Classroom: Easy Ways to Adapt Learning Centers for All Children

- Each chapter of this book describes practical ways to adjust centers and routines for children with special needs. The suggestions will enable diverse learners to stay involved in developmentally appropriate routines and center-based activities. Examples could also be used instructionally to provide students with opportunities to practice adapting environments. Categories of disabilities that are targeted by the suggestions include developmental delays, orthopedic impairments, pervasive developmental disorder (PDD) and autism, attention deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and behavioral issues, motor planning problems and visual impairments. - With illustrations and anecdotes that are appropriate for teachers and learners in both "regular" disciplines (e.g., child development, early childhood education) and "special disciplines" (e.g., early childhood special education, allied health), this text explores the essential elements of inclusive, responsive early childhood programs. Designed to promote interaction, reflection and action, *Opening Doors* offers an extensive field-experience component to help encourage a deeper understanding of bridging the gap between theory and practice. QuickNotes - 10-module set of information sheets covering a broad range of topics related to quality child care in a variety of settings (e.g., typical child development, promoting appropriate behavior, including children with special needs). Each topic is organized in a three-ring notebook that also provides a resource list of print materials and related web sites. Modules I-IX are provided in both English and **Spanish**. These are visually engaging, fresh materials that were developed to answer simple questions about early childhood inclusion and to provide quick, written resources on topics related to quality child care.

Integrating Therapies in Classroom Routines – Video shows therapists integrating their work in classroom settings (OTs, PTs, SLPs, early interventionists). Is My Baby OK? – Clear footage of two six month olds – one typically developing, and one with significant delays. Great resource for developing infant observation skills. **In Spanish.** Cost: \$10

It's Really No Different – A seventeen minute video tape of caregivers who have been through the process of including all children. They discuss their experiences, both in centers and in their homes. We hear them speak to their initial fears, their difficult times, and their success in opening their classrooms and homes to all children. This is the tape that I couldn't play, showing the provider who didn't want the child with disabilities in her class at first. Just Being Kids – In each of the six stories, the parents and providers discuss family goals, monitor developmental progress and reflect on their experiences. The companion *Facilitator's Guide* offers background information on the stories along with suggestions for facilitating activities to enhance viewers' learning. You saw Nolan and his family and how they figured out an alternative to bath time. Cost: \$75.

One of the Family – A video featuring four culturally diverse families, each with a young child with disabilities. Parents warmly describe the values that motivate them: including their children in all family activities, treating them as children first, expecting the most from them, becoming advocates for their children, and choosing professionals who support their family values. Families describe the process of grieving, being surprised by their children's gifts and learning to live a normal life. Cost: \$50

Meet teachers, administrators, parents, and students whose daily struggles and triumphs exemplify what inclusion really means and what it takes to make it work. That's a Family – In each segment of the video, children describe their unique family experiences, explaining concepts like “birth mom,” “mixed race,” “guardian,” “gay and lesbian,” and “stepdad.” *That's a Family* comes with an extensive discussion and teaching guide, and additional resources for teachers, families and children.
